ou know that saying that what's trending in Portland or San Francisco will come around to Missoula in 3-5 years? I detest that saying, and I'll tell you why: Missoula is a trendsetter, plain and simple. We've been ahead of the game for years, for example...

One of the early trailblazers of the craft beer movement is Missoula's very own Bayern Brewery. Jurgen Knoller was originally hired as the master brewer for Bayern in 1987, back when pretty much every bar in town only served three types of yellow beer. That year, a record-breaking 15 microbreweries opened in the US and Bayern was one of them! The movement was in such infant stages then that Knoller had to cross the border to Canada in order to source the yeast cakes necessary for brewing beer. Now there are close to 3,000 microbreweries across the country. Trendsetting, right?

Eating local has long been a priority to Missoulians. Take a walk along the Clark Fork River into Hellgate Canyon and see evidence of the farms that historically covered our valley. The first Missoula Farmers Market began offering locally grown produce back in 1972. May through October, the Downtown sidewalks are jam-packed with folks and their market loot of fresh and local greens, meats, cheeses, soap, coffee, vegan donuts, honey, Iraqi flatbread...the list goes on and on! That's some serious commitment to the slow food movement.

Food trucks are undoubtedly all-the-rage with foodies across the country and though we are just starting in on food truck lots in Missoula (have you had the burger with the bacon jam from Wally and Buck's in the parking lot next to the Southside Kettle House yet? It will change your life!), Missoula has been at the forefront of the mobile food scene since the first Out to Lunch in 1985. Wood-fired pizza, authentic tacos, creative ice cream, Thai, Indian, fusion of the two - you name it, and you can find it Wednesdays at Caras Park from 11 am - 2 pm. This year ushers in a handful of new vendors, as well as your favorites from years past. More of a night owl? Find yourself Downtown late on a Friday or Saturday night and Front and Main Street will be dotted with plenty of options for the discerning eater on-the-go.

Ask your computer where river surfing started, and after reading a bit about Munich, Germany being its birthplace in the early 1970s, you'll see our very own city and state highlighted as being one of the four river surf capitals of North America. Nowadays, action shots of surfers on the Clark Fork is Missoula's brand. Nobody blinks an eye at wetsuit clad individuals crossing Higains Ave Bridge at all hours. When I have out-of-town visitors, getting ice cream from the Big Dipper and watching the sunset and the surfers is #1 on my list of things to do. Cities across the country are scrambling to build their own waves after seeing the success of Brennan's Wave right here in Downtown Missoula.

I could go on, but I think my point has been made. We live and work in a creative and progressive community that breeds forward-thinkina recreational trends and small businesses. What are we doing now in Missoula that the hipsters across the Northwest will be all over in 5 years? I can't wait to see.

Out to Lunch & Downtown ToNight Kick-Off This Month

fter five months of planning and preparation, the Missoula Downtown Association (MDA) will launch the 31st annual Out to Lunch Summer Series on Wednesday, June 1 and the 16th annual Downtown ToNight Summer Series on Thursday, June 2. These free summer outdoor concerts events take place every week through June, July and August in Caras Park in the heart of Downtown Missoula.

The Out to Lunch Summer Series was started in 1986 and is the longest-standing outdoor food and music event in Montana. Each Wednesday during lunchtime from 11 am to 2 pm, folks can enjoy live music free of charge and/or purchase lunch from one of 23 food trucks and vendors in the park.

The Downtown ToNight Summer Series was created in 2001 and modeled after the very successful Out to Lunch program. Every Thursday after work from 5:30-8:30 pm, Missoula families and their guests enjoy adult beverages, food trucks, live music and children's playtime in Caras Park.

Seven new food trucks and vendors will be joining the fun, bringing lots of interesting and dynamic food choices to the mix. Those new vendors include Big Thai Country Food Truck, Butte Pasty Company, Ina's Indian Tacos, Kayle, Knuckleheads BBQ (returning after a 10-year leave), the Taco Treat Truck, and Wally & Buck. Of course many of Missoula's beloved favorites will also be serving up a wide variety of excellent foods for both programs.

Drawing close to 80,000 attendees over the course of the 13-week schedule, Out to Lunch and Downtown ToNight are funded entirely by Missoula-area businesses or organizations that purchase sponsorships, as well as vending fees. Nearly 70 businesses and organizations are supporting the programs this year.

Flowers Back in Downtown Baskets

Staff and volunteers of the Downtown Missoula Partnership hung the beloved Downtown Flower Baskets on Thursday, May 12, 2016 at 5:30 pm in Downtown Missoula. Six individuals were on-hand to hang 95 flower baskets created by Pink Grizzly at various locations around the Downtown area.

The Missoula Downtown Assoction (MDA) has been responsible for the Downtown Flower Baskets since 1981, and has expanded the program over the years. This year the MDA will spend \$10,000 on the flower baskets, and annually it allocates 15% of its membership dues to Downtown improvements.

"The MDA allocates a lot of resources on the Downtown Flower Baskets, and we are proud of our long-standing partnership with Pink Grizzly on the baskets," said Aimee McQuilkin, President of the MDA Board of Directors. "Shane Clouse and his staff help train our team on watering and fertilization, and with his support, we have made big improvements over the years."

The MDA waters the flowers each morning at 6 am seven days a week from mid-May through September and sometimes into October.

The baskets are watered a sec-(continued right) ond time in the evenings when the temperature reaches 80 degrees or higher. In partnership with the Downtown Business Improvement District, the MDA purchased a watering vehicle and tank in 2014 to supplement the hand-cart watering equipment.

The baskets are hung from street lights all along Higgins Avenue from the Northern Pacific Railroad Building to Hellgate High School on both sides of the street. Baskets are also hung on Front, Main, and Broadway from Pattee to Orange with a few baskets on Pine Street and in Caras Park.

Holiday Decor Phase 2 Upgrades Estimated at \$35,000

Summer is an interesting time to talk about the holidays, however, Downtown Missoula's electrical infrastructure for the holiday decorations has been deemed unsafe and outdated.

Phase 2 of the Downtown Holiday Décor Electrical Upgrades has been estimated at \$35,000, so the Missoula Downtown Association and the Missoula Downtown Foundation are seeking grants and donations to help fund the capital improvement project.

The electrical wire system connects power to each of the 150 holiday decorations on Downtown street lights, and the original system north of the river has degraded over the course of the last 40 years. Necessary upgrades include new conductors for each location and replacement of the circuit wires and lighting control equipment.

Hundreds Expected for Inaugural Montana Bicycle Celebration



undreds of people from all over the world and throughout the United States have already made plans to travel to western Montana for the inaugural Montana Bicycle Celebration, July 14 - 17, 2016. The celebration will commemorate the 40th anniversary of Bikecentennial and the completion of the Missoula to Lolo Trail. The weekend will include free, supported bike rides on the Bitterroot Trail, a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new trail at Travelers' Rest State Park in Lolo, a bicycle expo at Silver Park in Missoula, Sunday Streets in Downtown Missoula, and many other social events to be enjoyed.

The Bitterroot Trail bike rides will range from 10 to 100 miles, making the event inclusive to people of all ages and experience levels, from kids riding with training wheels to veteran Bikecentennial cyclists. Register for the free ride and optional one-way shuttles (for a nominal fee) at MontanaBikeCelebration.com by June 30.

Many of the guests planning to be part of the Montana Bicycle Celebration also participated in Bikecentennial, a 4,250-mile cross country bike ride with over 4,000 cyclists to celebrate the bicentennial of the United States, in the summer of 1976. Bikecentennial was planned in Missoula, and later became Adventure Cycling Association with a mission to inspire and empower people to travel by bicycle. Today, the national nonprofit organization has over 50,000 members and more than 45,000 miles of bicycle routes, including the original TransAmerica Trail that was created for Bikecen-

According to a study by the University of Montana's Institute for Tourism and Recreation Research, touring cyclists spend \$75 to \$103 per day and stay an average of eight or more nights in Montana. Partners of the Montana Bicycle

Celebration and the communities along the trail want to highlight the completed Bitterroot Trail as a tourism destination. A new website, BitterrootTrail.com provides yearround resources about businesses and services along the trail and serves as the event website for the Montana Bicycle Celebration.


The Montana Bicycle Celebration will continue each year as an annual event, thanks to a partnership between Adventure Cycling Association, Destination Missoula, Bike Walk Bitterroot, Bike Walk Alliance for Missoula, Missoula Parks and Recreation, Missoula in Motion, Missoula County Parks and Trails, Travelers' Rest State Park and Windfall.
