## MDA to Take Over Festival of Trees in 2017

fter planning and producing the Missoula Festival of Trees since 1999, Mountain Home Montana, and Festival Chairman Laura Snyder, have gifted the holiday event to the Missoula Downtown Association (MDA), which will look to build, expand and sustain the event into a festive holiday experience for all in the heart of Downtown Missoula.

"We are excited to have the opportunity to build upon Laura Snyder's success with this event, and we see great potential for the Festival of Trees to be a long-term, community-wide, holiday anchor experience for people of all ages, interests and backgrounds," said Aimee McQuilkin, owner of Betty's Divine and co-chair of the 2017 festival. "We plan to bring more modern and non-traditional concepts to the event, while sustaining some of the customary components that make this event so special."

The Festival of Trees Committee will look to build a beautiful Enchanted Forest December 2-9 with large and small trees, garland, lights, plants, holiday décor, furniture and more, and host several community events and holiday parties in the Forest. Examples include the Teddy Bear Tea for young children, a Holiday Soiree, the Downtown Missoula holiday party, and holiday parties for a select number of businesses. The committee is also looking to collaborate with the Missoula arts community for designing the space and trees, and they're interested in partnering with a Hellgate High School Senior to create and host a special high school dance as a senior project.

The MDA will start small with the 2017 event, but has the goal of expanding to a weeklong holiday festival, filled with community engagement, beautiful lights and décor throughout Downtown, an Enchanted Forest that draws a regional audience, and a variety of businesses and organizations in Missoula engaged with the festival. ## Parking Meter App Now Available



A pay-by-phone app for the parking meters has arrived and brings with it new conveniences for making sure your parking needs are covered. Here are some things to know about this new feature:

- The Passport app can be downloaded on Apple and Android phones for free.
- All rates are the same as they would be if paying at meter; same payment hours of M-F 9-5 apply; you can purchase time before 9am and it won't start until 9am.
- There is a .25 cent convenience fee when purchasing time.
- Time increments are 1/2 hr, 1 hr, 1.5 hrs, 2 hrs, 2.5 hrs and then hourly from there on.
- You can extend your time from the APP.
- The APP can save license plate info and recently parked zones so you don't have to enter it every time.
