### Trees, If You Please

he MDA strives to beautify Downtown in many ways and has fielded a number of calls regarding the trees that populate Downtown and the surrounding areas. Many trees are dead, dying, or in need of maintenance. These historical trees of various species are often as old as Missoula itself. Some, including the pervasive Norway Maple, are now considered invasive species. To keep the beautiful green canopy we enjoy, actions have been taken to replant an enduring generation of sustainable trees. The urban forest, as it's called, takes a great deal of work, and many city and non-profit organizations have worked to make it possible for new trees to flourish Downtown.

The Downtown Ambassadors compiled a list of dead and dying trees and empty tree grates around Downtown. That list was submitted to the city Forester of Missoula Parks & Recreation, who are working to replace those trees. Very recently, the urban Forester released guidelines and a list of approved tree species for property owners. The program makes it easy and affordable for property owners to work with the city to keep Missoula beautiful.

The Northern Rockies Regional Center of the National Wildlife Federation at 240 North Higgins was established in 1981. The Missoula office currently employs a staff of eight full-time and part-time employees. The Northern Rockies Regional Center's work advances wildlife conservation from the Dakotas to Hawaii.

National Wildlife Federation's mission is to inspire Americans to protect wildlife for our children's future. The organization pursues this mission by focusing on three conservation goals: protecting and restoring wildlife, connecting people with nature, and confronting global warming.

NWF works with 47 state affiliates, including the Montana Wildlife Federation, to empower people to conserve wildlife. NWF has over

4 million members and supporters and over 4,000 Montana members.

From its Missoula office, NWF pursues a variety of long-term projects aimed at preserving biodiversity, maintaining or improving connectivity of habitats and ecosystems, and protecting or restoring healthy ecosystems in the Northern Rockies Region. Among NWF's highest-profile initiatives is restoration of a significant herd of wild bison at the Charles M. Russell National Wildlife Refuge in north-central Montana.

Stay tuned for new Missoula-focused conservation education and outreach initiatives starting this fall, as NWF's new Wildlife Habitat and Sustainability Educator will reach out to diverse partners (including MDA members!) to promote wildlife habitat conservation at home, at school, and throughout the community. NWF aims to help Missoula be the first city in Montana to achieve Community Wildlife Habitat certification.

Above all, NWF wants to leave fish and wildlife populations in our region in better shape today and tomorrow than they were in past generations. NWF also aspires to build broader, stronger public support for wildlife conservation.

ow that summer is over, it's time to re-assess sidewalk signs in Downtown Missoula.

The Missoula Downtown Association will host a meeting on sidewalk signs on-Thursday, Sept. 18 from 8:30-9:30 am at the MDA Office (218 E. Main). Discussion will center around how many businesses are placing signs off premise, what that impacts are, and the potential development of a compremarketing hensive

concept to educate the public on shopping and dining options throughout downtown.

The City of Missoula lifted the sidewalk sign ordinance in December 2013, allowing businesses to place

signs off premise up to March of 2015, and Downtown Partnership staff agreed to monitor the number of signs being placed off premise. Proposed modifications to the ordinance will need to be submitted by October. City staff members Laval Means and Jen Gress will work with downtown stakeholders on potential modifications to the ordinance.
